Early Literacy Intervention...

Here is some information about ELI and what to expect if your child is chosen for the ELI program.

My Job Goal: To help students develop proficient **reading** skills that will contribute to their academic growth.

Responsibilities: **Reading interventionists** work extensively with students to help them improve specific **reading** skills such as letter-naming, initial sounds, phoneme segmentation, and comprehension strategies.

What does ELI stand for?

Early Literacy Intervention

The Fountas & Pinnell **Early Literacy Intervention** (ELI) is an intensive, small-group, supplementary literacy intervention for students who find reading and writing difficult. The goal of ELI is to lift the literacy achievement of students who are not achieving grade-level expectations in reading.

What is the difference between ELI and guided reading?

ELI is meant to supplement classroom instruction, whereas **guided reading** is differentiated classroom instruction. **Guided reading** is used with all students while **ELI** is used with **readers** who are having difficulty and are **reading** below grade level. Leveled books are used for both **guided reading** and **ELI**.
