January 4th, 2024, will be recognized as National Ribbon Skirt Day in Canada. Here at LSK, we will be planning a few activities for this special occasion. These sessions will be teacher led and will include: Teachings of the Ribbon Skirt (Elle Michael). There will also be a round dance. Raylene Denny, will be talking about the traditional Mi'kmaw Kojua and having a Kojua dance demonstration.

We will also be working diligently to restore the Tech Ed room at LSK. We are in the process of ordering new equipment to replace machinery that is obsolete and outdated.

## Junior High Literacy...

Happy New Year! As stated in the December note, every student or pair of students I meet with is working at their own pace on the topics that they need. Some are still solidifying short vowel sounds. Although many people know vowels by the examples of what they are, namely a, e, i, o, u and sometimes y, a definition that students learn with me is: "vowels are speech sounds that are not blocked by the lips, teeth or tongue." **Short** vowel sounds in particular can be tricky for everyone without direct instruction! Every speech sound has a keyword, and the sound will be at the beginning of that keyword whenever possible. For the short vowel sounds, they are:  $\boldsymbol{u}$  in up,  $\boldsymbol{a}$  in apple,  $\boldsymbol{e}$  in edge,  $\boldsymbol{i}$  in itch, and  $\boldsymbol{o}$  in octopus. When I started learning my method of instruction, it was very difficult for me to remember the short vowel sound for  $\boldsymbol{a}$ , and you could hear me repeating "apple, aaaaapple" over and over again! When these sounds are introduced, a model of the keyword is either brought in or manipulated. Apples, rulers (edges) and a backscratcher (to scratch an itch) have all been present in my lessons. In February, I'll share the interesting story of digraphs.
