So many students are doing so well with their learning through these cold months! Many have recently learned about **chunks**. After single letter consonants and vowels, followed by digraphs where two consonants come together to make one sound, the next *phonograph* students learn about is a **chunk**.

Unlike a digraph, like **ch** or **sh**, **chunks** have at least one vowel in them, \*but\* that vowel follows the expected sound following most English patterns! The letter a, for example, followed by an 'n' or 'm' does not make the expected short vowel sound like in at. Rather, the sound of the 'a' is pushed into the nose to make a **nasal chunk** like in can, jam, land or even scram!

Siewkesiku's the Forerunner of Spring has arrived. The Mi'kmaw language class has been very busy with cultural activities and guest speakers. Cheryl Maloney visited us here at LSK and spoke to the students about the Mic Mac hockey stick and the history of hockey and the Mi'kmaq people. Grade 8's are currently working on replicating a Mic Mac hockey stick in Tech class. We all have been making our own moccasins and enjoying storytelling in the process. Our students were given teachings on Mi'kmaw medicines and their purposes. They also made beautiful medicine pouches. Some exciting news, the crew from Mi'kmawey Debert Cultural Centre has approached me with a request to document myself and students on the land for the 2024 Mi'kmaq History Month videos and posters. We will be guiding a crew in land-based activities such as snaring, tree tapping, and bass fishing.

In language, students have been given weekly challenges on speaking Mi'kmaw in school and the community. Students are given small conversations such as saying weli eksitpuk and the response weli eksitpuk, me' talwuleyn? response weleyi or mu weleyu, nmultis ap! response nmultis!.

Some Mi'kmaw questions to challenge yourselves: Kewisin? Are you hungry? Kisi wije'wultis? Can I come with you? Ketu'samqwan? Do you want a drink? Ketu' pite'man? Do you want tea?

#### Grade Two... Mr. Tyler Schussler

I can't believe the month of February is already over and we've completed half of the school year. February was an excellent month as the grade 2 students had a lot of fun as they explored all the different learning avenues that were presented to them. In literacy, students continued working with non-fictional texts. Students continued to study the features of non-fictional texts as they explored topics such as; animal habitats, animal adaptations, outer space and information regarding the winter season. In math, students continued working on addition and subtraction challenges. Our geometry unit took place in February, which had students compare 2D and 3D shapes, classify 3D shapes and build 3D shapes so they could compare the similarities and differences each 3D shape have. Winter carnival (March 5-9)

March Spring Break (March 11-15<sup>th)</sup>

Good Friday no school (March 29<sup>th</sup>)

Students in grades 4-6 participated in an engaging Owl Pellet Dissection. In this activity, students dissected owl pellets and reconstructed the skeletons of animals inside to discover what the owls have been eating.

When you first see an owl pellet, you will probably think that it is feces, but this pellet has been regurgitated from the other end, the owl's beak.

Owls are predators and usually swallow and eat their prey whole, or at least in large chunks complete with bones, fur, and feathers. Prey species can include rodents, insects, lizards, rabbits, bats, snakes & birds, to name a few. In the owl's stomach, the soft matter is digested, but the fur and bones are regurgitated back out through the mouth in a little package, or pellet.

Pellets are important for scientific study because they give us a picture of what the owl eats, when, and in what frequency. The last time you read in some book what an animal eats, did you wonder how some scientist was able to learn that information? It would be too difficult to follow the animal around and watch it eat, especially at night when most owls feed. This means we have to examine things like pellets.

We are excited to announce that we will be starting a Robotics Unit in Late March early April. All grades from P-8 will be taking part.
